Welcome to Maine East Summer School!

The summer program at Maine Township High School East encompasses both academic and nonacademic areas. Summer session courses taken for credit are acceptable toward graduation. This brochure includes a complete listing of all courses offered at Maine East including course descriptions for Career Exploration Courses (held at Oakton Community College), cosponsored by NSERVE (North Suburban Educational Region for Vocational Education) and ETC (Education to Careers).

If a course is not offered at Maine East, you may take the course at one of the other District 207 High Schools. Please refer to brochures from Maine South and Maine West for specific course offerings. Registration procedures vary by school.

How Summer School can help you

You can use summer school to take courses you were otherwise unable to schedule into your program, to make up credit that you missed during the regular school year, or to explore an interest or career field. You should consult with your counselor regarding course selection for summer school.

Refunds & Course Credit

Course credit will be given only for completed summer school courses in which a student earns a passing grade. If a student chooses to drop a course, prior to the first day of the summer session, a refund will be issued, minus a \$25 processing fee. For registrations paid by credit card, a credit will be issued back to the card used at the time of registration. For registrations paid by check or cash, a refund will be issued by mail to the current address on file within 6 to 8 weeks. NO refund or course credit will be given for any course dropped due to attendance or behavior issues.

Financial Assistance

Financial assistance for academic courses is available to students who are enrolled in District 207 for the 2011-2012 school year and who qualify for reduced-price or free lunch. For most courses, students who qualify for free lunch for the 2011-2012 school year will receive a discount of \$100 for one course only; students who qualify for reduced-rate lunch will receive a discount of \$50 for one course only. Students on free or reduced lunch, who take **only** quarter credit classes, will receive a discount of \$50 for each $\frac{1}{4}$ credit course only. If a qualified student registers for more than one course, the discount applies only to one of those courses. **Financial assistance is not available for Driver Education or for incoming freshman.**

Attendance- Be there!

Because coursework is concentrated and equals the work assignments that would be received in a regular school year, attendance and punctuality are absolutely necessary. One day in summer school is equal to five or six days in the regular school year; therefore students must attend each and every day.

Students who are absent may be dropped from summer sessions with no refund or credit. Drops will occur upon the *second* absence in a 3-week course, and upon the *third* absence in a 6-week course. Students with excessive tardiness to class may be dropped from the course with no course credit and no refund. Students will not be excused for trips or vacations-please plan your summer accordingly.

Behavior and Discipline

All District 207 discipline policies and procedures apply during the Summer School session. Students who violate these policies may be dropped with no course credit or refund. During assigned break times, students must remain in the building and the assigned break area. Students are not allowed in other areas of the building, including but not limited to, parking lots, faculty lounge, gym areas, etc. Maine East is not an open campus. Cell phones may be used during assigned break times only.

Books

Books are not included in tuition. In most instances, books may be rented in the bookstore for a nominal fee. As long as the books are returned in good condition at the end of the session, no other charges will be incurred. In all other instances, on the first day of summer school, the classroom teacher will give students a list of required books and/or supplies.

Registration

Fill out the registration form found in this brochure. **Submit one form per student.** Mail or drop off the completed form, along with payment, to the summer school office, located in the principal's office, beginning Wednesday, February 22, 2012 at 7:30 a.m. and **no later** than Friday, June 8, 2012 at 3:30 p.m. You can mail it to: *Maine East High School, Summer School Office, 2601 W. Classes will be closed when maximum enrollment is reached and will be assigned on a first-come, first-serve basis until all sections are full. Classes with insufficient enrollment, or unavailability of staff, will be cancelled. Students will be notified if a class for which they are registered is cancelled, and their tuition and lab fee (if applicable) will be returned. This course allows students to spend 3 weeks in an elementary classroom in one of the following districts: 62 (Orchard and Plainfield), 63 (Apollo), or 64 (Franklin or Emerson). Students work with the teacher to plan and conduct daily activities. This helps students gain experience teaching, as well as develop an understanding of responsibilities and classroom management.

DRIVER EDUCATION (1/2 credit; \$350) [Separate Registration Process-See Your Counselor]

Driver Ed registration will begin on Wednesday, February 23, and continue through Thursday, February 24, in Room 173, before and after school. Qualified students who have completed **the pre-registration process, and have been notified of their candidacy by their counselors, will be eligible to register.** Students must be at least 15 years old on May 1, 2012 in order to participate in the summer Driver Education Program. **Please note that Driver Education lasts the full two semesters of Summer School.**

Prerequisite: These courses are offered for **credit recovery** purposes only; only students who have **failed the class may recover the credit in summer school**.

These courses focus on the three areas of English: language, literature, and composition. The emphasis in language is on developing and improving vocabulary, grammar, and mechanical skills. In literature, students are exposed to the various literary genres and work on reading, understanding, and discussing pieces of literature. The focus in composition is on developing good sentence writing, good paragraph writing, and finally, longer and more complex writing, along with strong research skills.

Career Exploration Courses for Summer School 2011-2012

Career Exploration Courses are three-week programs that introduce students to challenging careers. They offer students the opportunity to explore a variety of related career options, providing them with realistic perspectives about the skills needed for success in the workplace while emphasizing the connections between academics and careers. Classes will meet at Oakton Community College, Des Plaines campus. Transportation to and from each **district** is provided by NSERVE. Career exploration courses are open to students from Evanston, Glenbrook, Niles, Maine, and New Trier Townships. Students earn ½ elective credit.

Note: Students and parents will be asked to attend an *evening* orientation meeting at Oakton Community College, Des Plaines campus, on May 29, 2012.

Three summer courses are offered: **Careers in Engineering and Robotics**, **Careers in Business and Law**, and **Careers in Healthcare**. The courses incorporate classroom activities, lab activities, and field trips focused on careers in these clusters, affording students the opportunity to talk to professionals in their field of interest. Emphasis is placed on career skills, leadership, problem solving, team activities, and observation of the workplace.

Careers in Business and Law (1/2 credit; \$205)

Students will gain an overview of American business today, including first-hand knowledge of entrepreneurship, information systems, finance, marketing, management, and legal careers. They will gain competencies in investment strategies, business processes and planning, communication, collaboration, resource management and leadership skills. In addition, students will visit sites *such as* The Chicago Board of Trade, Kraft, the Circuit Court of Cook County, and Ogilvy & Mather, meeting with a variety of professionals.

Careers in Healthcare (1/2 credit; \$205)

Students will perform patient assessments, utilize medical laboratory and physical therapy techniques, and apply medical ethics in problem solving. They will travel to a variety of healthcare-related sites, *such as* Lutheran General Hospital, The Illinois College of Optometry, UIC Medical Center, and an emergency and critical care center, meeting with professionals in a wide variety of healthcare careers.

Careers in Engineering and Robotics (1/2 credit; \$205)

Students will have the opportunity to explore the related fields of engineering, electronics, robotics, and high-tech manufacturing.
